Many observers attribute the growth of the direct distribution system to the direct distribution of the market and specially comic book stores to the general recognition of Overstreet's annual management as a standardized inventory and pricing system. Started in 1970 by Robert M. Overstreet as a guide for other fans of the Golden Age and Silver Age comics, Overstreet's leadership has expanded to cover virtually the entire history of American comics back in the Victorian and Platinum ages. The annual edition is also promotional comics (gifts and advertisements) and big little books, constantly updating new publications and market reports that cover the previous year's market activity. Overstreet's annual comic book guide collecting a hobby in itself has become a collector's item, and since the 1980s each edition of the Price Guide has included a page list of collectibles for old publications, with print-binding editions, particularly selling for a premium. Price Guide is currently published in four formats: hardcover, softcover, larger, ring-related editions and electronic editions, often with multiple covers for each version. The story of Robert M. Overstreet grew as a comic, coin and Indian collector of arrowheads. In the 1960s, after abandoning a project to create a guide to the price of an arrowhead, Overstreet turned its attention to comics that didn't have a final guide. Comic book prices stabilized by the late 1960s, and Jerry Bailes, who recently published The Collector's Guide to the First Heroic Age, was considering creating a guide to the price of comics. He was contacted by Overstreet, who did the same. Bailes' extensive notes, supplemented by an overstreet study of dealer listings, became the basis of the Overstreet Comic Book Price Guide. Under the auspices of Overstreet Publications, the first guide to the price of comics was published in November 1970. Priced at \$5, saddle stitched and published in a print run of 1000 (the second edition of the 800 was released afterwards), the book included 218 pages of lists. Among other things, Overstreet's management included stock listings, and it instantly became an invaluable resource tool for comic book collectors and dealers. By 1976, the leadership had reached national distribution. The author made an early decision to exclude the niche of the underground comic book-oriented adult expression genre, which Mr. Overstreet was not interested in documenting, for reasons he never published, despite the fact that the book was promoted by its publisher as the most comprehensive list of comics from the 1500s to the present. Overstreet periodicals throughout the 1980s and 1990s, Overstreet also produced publications that will serve as price updates regarding new comic book releases from now on, with individual titles ranging from the Silver Age, including price guides to current and valuable comics, as well as comics and collectible news, and interviews. There was also some editorial content from publishers as well as from surveyed bookstore owners. Various incarnations of the publication (which were published quarterly for up to two months, and eventually monthly) included Overstreet's Comic Book Price Update, Overstreet Comics Price Newsletter, Overstreet Comic Book Monthly, and Overstreet's Fan, with this latest incarnation showing great similarities to the successful Wizard magazine news: A guide to comics. Overstreet also published twenty-one issues of Comic Book Book between March/April 1993 and January 1995. Ultimately, most of the titles were canceled, including Overstreet's Fan, which ceased publication in 1997. The sale of Gemstone Overstreet sold the business to Gemstone Publishing in 1994 and continues to author annual guides and related publications. In July 2003, Gemstone attempted another month by publishing the Overstreet Comic Price Review, which ran for only nineteen questions. They also published a 3 volume Overstreet Premium Ring Price Guide featuring the values of thousands of collectible toy rings of all types, the most valuable of which is the Superman of America Ring, which brings in about \$100,000, depending on the condition. The 50th edition (2020-2021) Overstreet Comic Book Price Guide went on sale on September 2, 2020. In connection with the 50th anniversary of the publication, Gemstone publishes a re-release of the Facsimile Edition of the first edition (1970), which was originally scheduled to be released on April 8, 2020, but was postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic. There will be three editions: softcover (retail price \$16.95), hardcover (\$25.00, limited to 400 copies), and a signed and edictomy hardcover (\$50.00, signed by Robert Overstreet and limited to 100 copies).
